2. *Methodology*

The study was conducted in a laboratory setting. The participants were recruited from a local university and were assigned to two groups: a control group and an experimental group. The control group consisted of 15 individuals, while the experimental group consisted of 15 individuals. The participants were randomly assigned to their respective groups.
