The study was approved by the ethics committee of the University of Toronto and all participants gave their informed consent.

The study was conducted in a laboratory setting. The participants were seated at a table and were asked to perform a series of tasks. The tasks were designed to measure the participants' ability to perform a task under different conditions.

The first task was a simple reaction time task. The participants were asked to press a button as soon as they saw a light. The second task was a more complex task that required the participants to perform a series of movements. The third task was a task that required the participants to perform a series of movements while maintaining a specific posture.

The data from the tasks were analysed using statistical software. The results showed that the participants performed the tasks under different conditions.

The study was limited by the laboratory setting. The results may not be generalizable to real-world situations.

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
